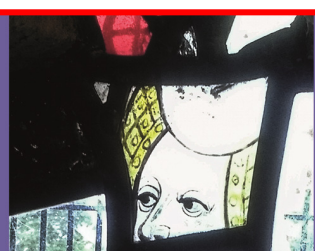


MARSTON UPDATE
