Last week, via John Pusey, from St Giles, Oxford, we received some good news from Paulina Fishman, who moved back to Melbourne Australia, back in September 2017 after her time ringing with us in Oxford. On Saturday $27^{\text {th }}$ May, we held our second Afternoon Outing of 2023, to three towers adjoining those we visited back in March, this time fitting in Shabbington (6), which we were unable to ring at in March, due to building work in the church. We managed to fit in a goodly number of different methods during our allotted time, from Plain Bob and Grandsire, to Double Oxford, Stedman and Cambridge.

success on a beautiful May afternoon. The first tower - Little Milton, having first ascended the long (to me) ladder, were a lovely set of 6 bells. The second - Great Milton, a set of 8, directly next door to Le Manoir, had the addition of unwittingly ringing for a wedding taking place in the grounds of the hotel. After a pause in the ringing to allow the ceremony to take place, we continued. Hopefully the bride and groom appreciated our efforts, and the unexpected bells
 at their ceremony!
The third - Shabbington, was a 6 bell reverse/anticlockwise ring.
Being someone who is now starting to grapple with "inside bells/work" this tower totally emphasised the need to "know your place", and also to check the towers in the Doves guide beforehand!
